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Message from the Scout Executive...



Welcome to October! I am excited because we are well into another program year. Recruitment seems to be progressing well. Our advancement numbers are up, and we are training more leaders. Thank you all for making that happen. The cool nights and shorter days also indicate that it's almost time for our annual Scouting for Food Good Turn which is scheduled for Saturday November 16th. I hope that every pack, troop, team, crew, and post take the time to participate in some aspect of this year's collection effort.

This year, the council is providing professionally printed door hangers that your unit can distribute in your chosen neighborhoods and then go back on November 16th, collect the food and take it to a collection center. If you have not yet signed up to participate in Scouting for food, you can do so on the council website. You can even select the specific part of your neighborhood where you will conduct the collection. **Please sign up for Scouting for food and coordinate your collection effort with the district. We want to avoid "double dipping" some neighborhoods and missing others altogether.** If your unit would prefer to assist in some other way besides collecting food, help is needed at collection centers to count and sort the food in each district. Please contact your District Executive or District Scouting for Food Chairperson to offer assistance.

Community Service is an important aspect of the Scouting Program. It's in our DNA. In fact our national website states that: "Young people need to serve. The level of community service is a good indication of the health of any society. Scouting has, from its inception, been deeply rooted in the concept of doing for others. "Do a Good Turn Daily" is a core Scouting precept." As I researched the facts I found that through the years, Scouting has always provided notable service when America needed it most.

- 1912:** The first national civic Good Turns were performed
- 1914:** The first tree-planting project was held in New York
- 1917:** Scouting's full resources were placed at the service of the government with a new Slogan: "Help Win the War"

Scouts' War Effort: 1917–1918

- Sold Liberty bonds and war savings stamps totaling more than \$355 million.
- Collected 100 railroad cars full of nutshells and peach pits for gas mask manufacturing
- Distributed more than 300 million pieces of government literature
- Aided in food and fuel conservation projects
- Planted 12,000 Boy Scout war gardens.

1918: BSA adopted the slogan "The War Is Over, but Our Work Is Not". Scouts rendered nationwide service during the influenza epidemic

1919: U.S. Bureau of Naturalization invited Scouts to aid in its Americanization program

1934: President Roosevelt called for help from the Scouts for the distressed and needy. This nationwide Good Turn resulted in the collection of 1,812,284 items of clothing, household furnishings, foodstuffs, and supplies.

A Legacy of Good Turns (cont)

Scouts' War Effort: 1941–1945

- Included 69 specific requests from the government
- Collected 30 million pounds of rubber during a two-week drive
- 20,000 Scouts earned the Gen. Douglas MacArthur Medal for Victory Gardens
- Distributed pledge cards for war bonds and savings stamps
- Distributed stamp posters .
- Collected aluminum, wastepaper, and salvage
- Conducted defense housing surveys
- Distributed air-raid posters
- Served as messengers and dispatch bearers
- Assisted emergency medical units
- Served as fire watchers

1952: 2 million pounds of clothing were collected for domestic and foreign relief. Likewise, we distributed more than a million posters and 30 million Liberty Bell doorknob hangers in the Get-Out-the-Vote campaign.

1971: The BSA launched the first Scouting Keep America Beautiful Day, where Scouts collected more than a million tons of litter.

1988: First Scouting for Food National Good Turn was conducted and more than 60 million food items were collected the first year. During the ensuing 25 years many millions more have been collected and countless people have been able to eat because of this effort.

2008: Arrow Corps 5 was launched. It was a partnership between the Order of the Arrow and the US Forest Service. 3,600 Scouts and adult volunteers participated, and \$5.6 million worth of improvements were made to national parks and public lands.



I hope that all units participate in our Legacy of Good Turns and make the time to participate in some aspect of Scouting for Food. If your schedule does not allow you to participate, then by all means choose something else. There is much to do and too few people to do it in all of our communities. Thank you for passing on this important lesson to our young people. Regardless of what project you do, Scouting For Food or something else – take the time to record your project on the national Good Turn website that can be found at www.myscouting.org. For specific instructions on reporting your unit's service hours, see the article further down titled **Reporting Service Hours**.

Reporting Service Hours

All unit service projects should be reported on the Service Hours Reporting tab at myscouting.org. Every time your unit does a service project, someone should take 3 minutes and log it on the national site. We know that your unit does many great things throughout the year. If we have details, we can tell others and help to demonstrate the value of scouting to the general public. The steps are simple:

1. Log on to www.myscouting.org. (If you haven't done so yet, you will need to set up a [myscouting account](#).)
2. Once you are logged in, you can find the "Service Hours Reporting" tab on the left hand side of the home page in the blue box under unit tools.
3. If you have not done so already, you will have to set up a service hours account.
4. If you are a new user select [New Users Click Here](#), agree to the Confidentiality Statement, and register your new account.
5. You will need a unit ID — contact the Council Office if you need this number.
6. Once you have registered and have an account you simply fill out the electronic form every time your unit completes any service project.*

Thank you for taking the time to report the great work that you are doing!
