WOOD BADGE

**A Testimonial by Richard Kleitman,
participant in Wood Badge course W3-59-12-1**

I am living proof that the skills taught in BSA leadership training are every bit as relevant and valuable as any training you can attend.

Wood Badge was a fantastic experience that taught me you **can** teach an old dog new tricks! I was in the bear patrol with one or two long time friends and several new ones. We learned valuable lessons in communication, leadership, the aims and goals of scouting and most importantly in the way a pack, troop, crew or post should operate using the PATROL method. We got a chance to see how an optimal-sized unit should work, how information travels up and down the chain of command, and most importantly how to have fun. We sang, we competed against and served alongside other patrols, but most important each of us got a chance to lead.

Was it worth it? To answer that I need to share a bit of my background... You see, I am not a first-timer when it comes to scout leadership training. While a scout I participated in the National Troop Leader Development Training Course at Philmont and then was on staff as Senior Patrol Leader or Course Director for seven years in a row with the Stanford Area Council TLD course. I attended my first Wood Badge course back in 1979. I utilized the skills taught me in every aspect of my life. At the age of 20 I found myself supervising 16 people, all of them older than me and some twice my age — I was given the job because of the leadership knowledge demonstrated at the interview. I have gone on in my education to seek a doctoral degree in Educational Leadership (unfortunately I am what is known as ABD, All But Dissertation completed). In those doctoral classes I wrote at least two papers based on the skills I had learned at Wood Badge. I actually cited the BSA Troop Leader Development course syllabus as a reference and earned A's on both papers. I am living proof that the skills taught in BSA leadership training are every bit as relevant and valuable as any training you can attend.

Two great questions! Friends of Scouting (FOS) is the annual giving campaign of the Greater Yosemite Council and provides the necessary funds to ensure a quality Scouting program for youth. More specifically, by supporting FOS, you help keep:

- The cost of Council camps affordable
- The Council Service Centers and camp facilities in top condition
- The promise of a quality Scouting experience to your son or daughter and others in Scouting

There are three FOS campaigns each year: the Family Campaign, the Executive Board Campaign, and the Business Campaign. Each is vital to the programs and services of the Council. The money raised through the annual FOS campaign offsets the cost of training Scouting leaders, operating the Council camps and service centers, and providing other resources to Cub Packs, Scout Troops, Varsity Scout Teams, Venturing Crews, and Sea Scout Ships throughout the Council – 436 units in all.

It costs the Greater Yosemite Council approximately \$160 to provide a quality Scouting experience for one registered Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, Venturer, or Sea Scout per year. Parents of Scouts and other neighborhood and community members play an invaluable role in the annual FOS campaign by contributing money that reflects their respect for what the program can achieve and their ability to give.



Membership

This month we focus on Webelos to Scout Transition.....

The passage from Cub Scout pack to Boy Scout troop should be smooth, with no time lost in between. By the time Webelos Scouts are ready to cross over, they and their families should be familiar and comfortable with the youth and adult leaders of the troop, their role in the troop and troop activities, and feel excited about beginning this new adventure. The Webelos Scout's graduation ceremony should clearly signify his transition to a new level of Scouting, and could include the presentation of his Arrow of Light Award, a *Boy Scout Handbook*, and a troop neckerchief.

A Webelos Scout who has earned the Arrow of Light Award has now completed all the requirements for the Scout badge and may join a Boy Scout troop.



The key factor to improved Webelos transition is the ongoing working relationship of the leaders of a Cub Scout pack and a Boy Scout troop. Ideally a community organization would have both a pack and a troop with leaders who work together to help move Webelos Scouts into a Boy Scout troop the same way schools move students from elementary school to middle school.





My.Scouting.org Tools

This past year some new tools were added to MyScouting.org. These are located on the my.scouting.org website portal. Notice this is different than MyScouting. You can access the new site from your MyScouting page. The username and password are the same as your MyScouting Account. One of the tools is very special for trainers, and Key 3* members at the Unit, District and Council level - Training Manager! Note that I said Unit! A scouter can check up on his or her training records.

The Training Manager Tool gives administrators the ability to view training status, print training reports and certificates, and update training records of Scouters in their unit or service area. Individuals can check their training status, including if their Youth Protection Training is up to date.

Two features were added after the initial release that will help you know who is trained and who needs training. The first is a "trained" icon that shows up in the "Search Training" roster so you can quickly see who is, and who is not considered "trained" in the system. The second is the "Trained Leaders Report" that shows who is "trained" and specifically which courses are missing that would make a leader "trained."

The "Trained Leaders Report" can be printed so that those missing training can be targeted for training or so that their record can be updated with missing courses.



This is a "work in progress" and more features to the Tools are in development:

- As we write this *update* only unit, district, and council Key-3s* have access to most of the tools. Soon, they will be able to grant administrator rights to others in their unit or service areas.
- Administrators will be able to assign functional positions to members that will give them access to related Tools. For example, the Key-3* can designate a training chair, and that will give the training chair access to the Training Manager.
- The list of "legacy" courses - old BSA training courses that still make a leader "trained" - is often confusing since the names are similar. New codes are being developed that we hope will help. For example, we might create "C101 - Cub Scout Leader Basic Training" that would cover all of the Cub Scout leader basic training courses prior to the introduction of *Specifics* in 2001. The entry of the new code/course and the date the Scouter completed the course will mark the leader as "trained." We will know which version of the course the Scouter took by the date entered.

Some key items from the BSA website to keep in mind:

- 1) Make a plan. Cold weather can be unforgiving. Plan for the unexpected.
- 2) Make sure everyone is physically prepared. That means you too, leaders!
- 3) Proper nutrition is important. You'll need quality AND quantity.
- 4) Two-deep leadership is more important than ever.
- 5) Proper equipment is crucial. Go over every item needed on this trip with each Scout, and possibly with their parents.

Cold Winter events can be the most fun Scouts will have all year... but only if everyone stays safe.
